Each child was asked what they wanted to be when they grew up. The answers ranged from "princess" and "cop."


The students received their diplomas then proceeded to change from their caps and gowns into their performance clothes.



She explained her initial thoughts about not needing a college education, "Why should I go to college, I'm good. I'll be okay."

Two years after graduation, she reevaluated the notion, during a conversation with her older brother. When he decided to go back to college, she said, "if he's trying to better his life, why can't I?"

Bonales stated that she graduated with honors and fulfilled her dream. "After that, I moved on. I'm not going to let anybody stop me. I'm not going to let anybody shoot me down."

After her first year of college, she asked her younger brother what he's doing with his

life. He finally decided to go to college, and much like his older sister, he asked her where to start.

"How do you do it, where do you go? Those two questions, changed my life, and changed my brothers' lives."

Bonales also spoke to the female graduates, "For the ladies who graduated, I am a female, going into a man's profession, as a mechanic and a welder. Any of you that want to do it, you can do it. I'm the proof. Don't let anyone tell you that you can't do it, because they're wrong."

Joseph Thomas, a student at UNR also spoke to the graduates about college life.

Although he stated he was unprepared for the speech, he gave his insights, "Get in contact with people who are like-minded, don't get stuck in the negative part of college, but have fun."

After the keynote speakers finished, Cavanaugh called up the individual graduates to receive Pendleton blankets and certificates of achievement.

Time was slated for open mic, where community members congratulated the students. Each student was asked to give a short speech, thanking their families for their support.

Dinner with the community began after the ceremony.

Molly Snapp, a graduate and former recipient of the scholarship, was considered a prime example of the program's success. She finished college, began working for Barrick, then returned to help the community.

Pedestrian Safety

I wanted to do a special article this month on a topic that I have found that I am very passionate about. That topic is pedestrian safety. Before coming to work for the Tribe, I was a crossing guard for five years. During this time and my time working in law enforcement and traffic this passion has grown. So aside from that why talk about it now? Our town has seen a very high rate of pedestrian crashes over the last month and a half or so. I know of at least five. That is a crazy high and unacceptable number. I have also read about several others not in our town. Two of these pedestrian crashes involved two people I care deeply about. One has recovered and one was recently release but has months of recovery due to extensive injuries.

Often, we don't really think about pedestrian safety until school begins again or around Halloween. But now is the time to think about it and be aware. The weather is warming up and our littles are getting out school soon, others are out walking for exercise and just to enjoy the warm weather.

There are many things we can do to make walking a safer activity. The first thing to remember is, even when at a crosswalk, "DON'T ASSUME A DRIVER IS GOING TO STOP FOR YOU!" While pedestrians have the right away when at crosswalks, drivers do not always stop. This could be for several reasons; the driver is distracted by see you, or sadly the driver is just a jerk and doesn't want to stop.

When out walking be sure that you are following the rules. When available, always use the sidewalks and crosswalks. Wear visible clothing, although white is not the best option. White along with black clothing are much harder to see than if you are wearing a bright pink or blue shirt. Visible clothing is necessary both during the day and at night time. At night, be sure to have a flashlight along with visible clothing.

Be aware of your surroundings and time of day. Certain times of the day are not the best for walking, such as the beginning and end of the work day, use caution if you are walking during these times. Also, when the sun is going down is also a hard time of day, due to the sun being more in the middle of sky, it can make it hard for drivers to see.

Look both ways before crossing the street, more than once. Sometimes vehicles seem to appear out of nowhere. Be sure if you are wearing headphones, you can still hear what is going on around you. Headphones that block out all other sounds are not ideal for using while walking. Don't text and walk, look at where you are going. Not can texting and walking lead you to trip and fall, it also makes you a target for crime because you are not aware of what is going on around you.

These few things can help make you a safer pedestrian.




While in high school he was very active in sports. He played one year of basketball, one year of wrestling, four years of baseball, and four years of football and earned his varsity letter.
